About Netaji Subhas Open University:

Netaji Subhas Open University is the premier State Open University in India. The year 1997 was the birth centenary year of Netaji Subhas Chandra Bose. The Chief Minister of West Bengal made an announcement at a State function that an Open University would be set up soon, and dedicated to Netaji's hallowed memory. The then Higher Education Minister, Govt. of West Bengal spearheaded the idea after his visit to the Open University in U.K. Under his instruction was set up a ten-member steering committee headed by late Dr. Bhaskar Ray Chowdhury, former Vice-Chancellor of Calcutta University.

Following this, a State Act (W.B. Act (XIX) of 1997 and Recognised by U.G.C.) was passed on the 20th August 1997 in favour of opening a university for imparting Distance Education. Netaji Subhas Open University was established by bifurcating Netaji Institute of Asian Studies (NIAS) in terms of the Act of West Bengal State Legislative Assembly. It was housed in the historic residential building of Sri Sarat Chandra Bose, elder brother of Netaji. The University started functioning with effect from July 1998 Semester, only with the Bachelor's Degree Programme in Arts & Commerce to provide an opportunity of higher education in the vernacular medium to various disadvantaged groups of aspiring learners. It is the tenth Open University of the country and the ninth State Open University.

The School of Humanities is one of the newest entities at Netaji Subhas Open University, culled out of the erstwhile School of Humanities and Social Sciences on 5th June 2015 vide Memo No. Reg/1010 which is a follow through to clause 15.(1) of Netaji Subhas Open University 1st Statute (Revised) 2014.

The establishment of the School of Humanities (SOH) marks a reiteration of the commitment of Netaji Subhas Open University to underline the need of devising strategies for capacity building through Humanities. With this broad goal in mind, the SOH intends to pursue serious academic research and offer programmes to learners within the precincts of the Open and Distance Learning mode. With dynamic and vibrant faculty to moot, the vision of the School is to intensify outreach through ODL so as to inculcate an ambience of cultural-literary pursuits that has always been the forte of the state of West Bengal. The mission of SOH is to foster a community, cutting across institutional lines, that will disseminate the study of language and literatures in vernaculars and English, encourage trans-literary activities, become a centre for pan-India literary confluence and in due course of time evolve as a window to the wider world from this part of the country. In a nutshell, the endeavour of the SOH will be to rear itself in the true spirit of Open Learning.

Our hand-picked human resource is well augmented with a state of the art Interactive Learning Centre that serves as a hub in the creation of next generation multimedia materials, a full fledged Editing laboratory for training learners of Journalism and Mass Communication courses, infrastructure for smart classrooms and a well stocked library. The faculty of the SOH have engaged themselves in UGC-DEB sponsored projects and this keeps them in constant interactions with the wider academia. Our faculty are also invited for consultancy and special academic exchanges by institutions both in the ODL and regular modes.

As regards our regular way of functioning, while keeping up the trend of intensive Personal Contact Programmes (PCP's) that is characteristic of NSOU, the new School eagerly awaits the resuming of PhD programmes in conformity with revised UGC rules. In the context of our existing courses both at Graduation and Post Graduation levels, we are on constant vigil in updating and revising syllabi, monitoring academic delivery, organising counselor workshops and learner interactions as also nurturing our learners with an individualised holistic approach.

Establishment and Functioning of Academic Campus of SOH at Kalyani

The most important task before the nascent School of Humanities was setting up of its second office in the Kalyani Academic Campus--- a task which was undertaken with promptitude and efficiency through the rapid work of constructing faculty cubicles, an office of the School, setting up of two classrooms for Post Graduate PCPs, including a smart classroom with State-of-the-Art facilities and shifting of the language laboratory from the first to the second floor of the building. The Kalyani campus SOH is now functional since November, 2015 with regular PCPs for Bengali post graduate learners being conducted there. The language laboratory has also been functional as editing studio of the Audio-visual lectures recorded by the School faculty. Updation of facilities at the School in Kalyani is a continuous process in order to improve the teaching-learning processes of the University.





Infrastructural Development

Since the inception of the School and recruitment of a host of new faculty in 2015, there has been an ongoing process of developing infrastructure at both premises of the School at both Campuses---At Salt

Lake and in Kalyani. In this regard there has been the partitioning and setting up of faculty cubicles and the SOH office in both places. LAN Connected printing and photocopying machines have made work faster. A **Smart Classroom** with state-of-the-Art facilities for conducting ICT enabled Lectures and upgradation of A existing **Language Laboratory cum Media Laboratory** at the Kalyani Campus of SOH, have been feathers in the cap of this newly -formed School this session.

Report on the Regular Academic Activities of the School

Apart from seminars, workshops and colloquiums the School of Humanities engages in regular academic activities, bringing in innovative patterns in its teaching-learning paradigm, to improve upon the existing academic practices of the Open University System. Here is a brief report of the regular and new activities undertaken by the School in the years 2015-2016.

Personal Contact Programme (PCP)

In the Open University System, the Personal Contact Programmes are an innovative practice to bridge the distance between the Learner and the facilitator, where the learner already well-equipped through the Self Instructional Materials is given further support in the classroom by providing opportunities to clarify doubts and satisfy queries. The School of Humanities conducts PCPs for PG English, Bengali, ELT and Journalism and Mass Communications at PCP Eight centres in Kolkata, such as---Women's Christian College(English, ELT), Gurudas College (English), Maharaja Manindra Chandra College (JMC, PRAD)--- and in the districts such as---Coochbehar College (English, Bengali), R.L.Khan college Midnapore (English, Bengali), Bankura Christian College (English, Bengali). There is good response of interested learners at all these centres.

School Programmes (2015-16)

Since its inception as an independent entity, from the bifurcated erstwhile School of Humanities and Social Sciences, the School of Humanities has actively engaged in richly contributing to the burgeoning pedagogical and research components of the University through its activities.

1. The first initiative of the nascent School, under its newly appointed Officer-In charge, was to organize 4th Rabindranath Tagore Memorial Lecture on 07.02.2015. at the Seminar Hall, Salt Lake Campus. The Speaker of this memorial Lecture was Sri Jawhar Sircar, CEO, Prasar Bharati



2. A Bachelor's Degree Programme (BDP) English Workshop for Counsellors was held on on 30th June, 2015 at the Seminar Hall, at the Salt Lake Campus. The thrust of the workshop was to formally announce the release of the First Four books of the Self Instructional Materials (SIM) of the Elective English Honours (New syllabus) and also to create an interface between the Content-writers/Editors of the SIMs and counselors who would teach them in the undergraduate classes.



3. The 9th Colloquium of the UGC DEB Research Project titled "Reading Indian Literature in Bengali: An ODL Praxis" of Dr M K Mandal was held at NSOU headquarters. The two illustrious speakers were Shri Manohar Mouli Biswas, noted activist and writer on Dalit identities, and the noted Bengali writer Shamim Ahmed. On this occasion Adhunik Bharatiya Sahitya Prasange Vol II was published.



- 4. The 10th Colloquium of the UGC DEB Research Project titled 'Reading Indian Literature in Bengali: An ODL Praxis" of Dr M K Mandal was held on 28th August, 2015 at NSOU headquarters. The two speakers at this Colloquium were Dr Anamika Das Assistant Professor in Bengali, NSOU who spoke brilliantly and exhaustively on the History of Bengali Detective Stories and Sharadindu's Byomkesh Bakshi. The other half of the Colloquium was illuminated by the engaging talk of Dr Antara Mitra, Assistant Professor in Sanskrit on on different variations of 'Panchatantra'
- 5. A One-Day Orientation Programme on BDP Bengali Counselling in ODL System was organized by the School on 16th September, 2015. Like all regular and continuing orientation programmes of the University this Orientation programme sought to engage in discussions to devise a concrete methodology to ensure the proper teaching and dissemination of the syllabus, in keeping with the spirit of ODL systems. Honourable Vice Chancellor was preside over the inaugural session.



6. The School organized a One-Day UGC-DEB Project-Based National seminar on 1st October, 2015 on "Postcoloniality, Subalternity and Indian Writing in English: The Open Learning Praxis."

The School of Humanities organized a One Day UGC-DEB Sponsored National Seminar on 8th October, 2015 on 'Translation Studies in Open Praxis', a pioneering event under the newly established Centre for Language, Translation & Cultural Studies of the University under the aegis of the School of Humanities. It brought together noted academicians of Translation studies such as Tagore Professor Uday Narayan Singh, Professor Debaprasad Bandyopadhyay, Professor Mahidas Bhattacharya and Translators of Asamiya (Dr Mukti Choudhury), Odiya (K.C. Bhuinya) Kokborok (Dr. Tanuja Majumdar) to Bangla such as, thus seeking to explore the logistics of effective translation and also to build a pool of ready translators who would undertake upcoming projects at the behest of this Centre in the coming days. Prof U N Singh was the Key-note speaker.



- 8. The 11th Colloquium of the UGC DEB Research Project titled 'Reading Indian Literature in Bengali: An ODL Praxis" of Dr M K Mandal was held on 8th January, 2016 at NSOU headquarters where the eminent speaker was Professor Biplab Chakraborty, who spoke on 'Early Phases of Bengali and Marathi Novel: A Comparative Study'. His talk enriched an audience with hitherto unknown or relatively scant knowledge of Marathi literature.
- 9. One of the most Prestigious Lecture of the University—The Rabindranath Tagore Memorial Lecture---this year was given by noted Professor of Linguistics Ganesh Devy on 12th March, 2016. It is a Lecture which is organized by the School of Humanities and it was a rare honour this year to be able to host Professor Devy, whose lecture on "Silence and Freedom: The Paradox of the Future" left every member of the audience thinking about the eventual fate of human speech and expression dwindling into the black hole of silence.
- 10. A One-Day Orientation Programme on PG Bengali Counselling in ODL System was organized by the School on 19th March, 2016. Like all regular and continuing orientation programmes of the University this Orientation programme sought to engage in discussions to devise a concrete methodology to ensure the proper teaching and dissemination of the syllabus, in keeping with the spirit of ODL systems. An Orientation Programme on Documentary, with Shri Debjyoti Chanda, faculty of Mass communication and Videography at Rabindra Bharati University, as resource person was held on 19 July 2016 for the students of Journalism and Mass Communication, 2015-16 batch was held on 14th July, 2016 at the NSOU Headquarters.



- 13. A meeting of Centre Coordinators and Academic in Charge of PGBG & PGEG for ensuing PCP was held on 16th November 2016 at the NSOU headquarters. Discussions and deliberations were focused to the management of PG English PCP and to enhance the academic quality of the learning process.
- 14. Centre of Language, Translation and Cultural Studies (CLTCS) organize an International Colloquium on 12th December, 2016. Online Student Support Services (SSS) through Social Media and Google Chat

One of the pioneering Pilot projects undertaken by the nascent School of Humanities was the introduction of Online Student Support Services for Post Graduate Learners of English, Bengali and ELT, spread all over the state of West Bengal. The mechanism of operation was simple--- all that the learners were required to do initially was to create valid Gmail account on an internet enabled computer/smart phone; log into this account, go to chat option and send invite to the relevant faculty ID from the lists circulated at study and PCP centres. Users of facebook were asked to send friend requests to the relevant facebook ID. Once the request was accepted, the learner could then initiate subject specific chat with the concerned faculty according to timings mentioned. For five days a week between 15th February-29th April, 2016 the in-house faculty of the School in English, Bengali and ELT were available to chat live via the facebook pages created for the purpose or via google chat. This was a novel way to introduce support for distance and distant learners; from providing answers to their specific academic queries, to encouraging them for learning wholeheartedly, it was a unique and never-before-attempted means to establish links between the learners and the facilitators, above and beyond the existing PCPs organised by the University. It is the unique brain-child of the School, which it hopes will be a trendsetter in the ODL practices at the University.

The online support service was executed in the second year of its operation in the 2016-17 academic sessionwith similar participation by in-house faculty, and to the enthusiastic response of the learner community. The service was made available for the period between 15th January and 31 march 2017 for Post Graduate programmes in Bengali, English and ELT.

Induction Meetings at Study/ PCP Centres in the Districts

Conducting yearly induction programmes for the newly-enrolled UG and PG learners of the University in the study centres of the Districts is an important task of every school of the university to establish vital links with learners spread over a wide geographical area, with whom such contact is otherwise difficult during the course of the academic year. In this connection the School of Humanities conducted the following Induction Programmes in the session 2015-16:

Audio-Visual Lectures

A vital and indispensible component of the Open Learning system is the supplementing of SLMs with audio-visual lectures to make learning more vivid and meaningful for the distance-learner. It is with this aim that the School of Humanities planned its Project of recording Audio-Visual Lectures in English, Bengali and ELT for PG learners. A core team of technicians assisted in the recording and editing process, giving final shape to the endeavors of the faculty---who not only planned, designed but also edited their lectures with multimedia elements. The first phase of this project, with 65 lectures, is complete and released in the form of DVDs with ISBN, ultimately designed to reach interested learners of the University.

Hence, in keeping with this spirit of Open learning, the School of Humanities has been able to revise or rewrite its Self Learning Materials in English, Bengali, ELT and Journalism. Specifically to be noted is the syllabus revision of Elective English Honours course, which has led to the stupendous task of producing 8 fresh SLMs for learners enrolled in the BDP course since the 2015 Session. The first phase of the SLMs saw the release of the First 4 books, the 5th Book has come out in the month of June and the others should be out before the close of the year.

- iii) Research oriented work in Humanities
- iv) Curriculum based Reference/Supplementary Reading materials.
- v) Publication of Journals/ Periodicals/ Bulletins in print or in ICT enabled electronic media etc.
- (f) To offer various language and translation related self-financed courses preferably not exceeding the duration of 6 months. Such courses shall not involve the Examination department of NSOU. Such courses may be designed in consultation with Experts Committees duly constituted by the Centre.

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
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


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
